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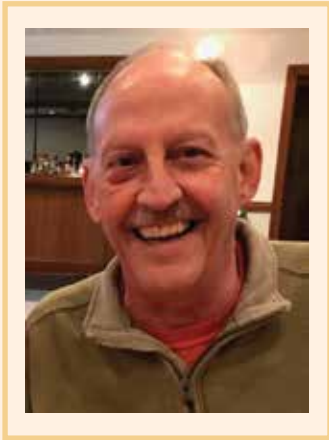
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Long-Time Borough Employees Retiring

The Borough of Emmaus has been blessed with many fantastic, dedicated employees and volunteers over the years. As the years have passed, these individuals have helped shape our community into one of the best in the entire nation. The time has come, however, that many of those individuals that have helped shape our community, have decided it's time to relax and enjoy retirement. We would like to thank the following individuals for their many years of dedication to our community. Each one will be missed or are already missed by all of us.



Jim Farnsworth

If you have ever needed a permit or had a Code issue in the past 31 years, there's a very good chance you know Jim Farnsworth. Jim is retiring as our Code Official after 31 years of dedication to our community. When Jim was hired in 1988, he had a lot of work to do, as our community was much like the wild west, as there was a lack of uniformity and standards in building in the community. Having already been an experienced Code Official, Jim quickly went to work and helped the community reshape its building and codes standards in conformity with state and federal codes. He has helped reshape expectations in our community and created a Codes Department that held community members accountable to our laws and codes. However, as nearly everyone knows, Jim wasn't just the guy who enforced the law. He would spend a great deal of time educating our citizens and trying to help them build projects that would be in compliance with Codes. He spent more time educating than enforcing. He spent countless hours in meetings with residents who simply didn't understand the laws or how to construct a project that would fit within the Codes.

Jim also served as the Borough's certified Public Works Inspector, as he assisted the department with numerous projects, ensuring that they met Codes and PA standards. He spent many hours assisting Public Works employees with designing and constructing projects that would be long-lasting and beneficial to the community.

Jim is a person that has served our community with pride and dedication. We often say that the one job we wouldn't want is the Codes Official job. It's a job where you often bring bad news to property owners, need to enforce ordinance and state laws, and are often entangled with someone that is unhappy about something. As our community knows, Jim spent his career thriving in this role, as his sole goal was to make Emmaus a better place to live, and he has spent his entire career spearheading many different initiatives.

Most of all, Jim is a person that our employees and community members truly enjoy working with. He has served as a co-worker, as a friend, and as a mentor to more individuals that he will realize. His humor and infectious laugh helped his co-workers get through many difficult days, and it also helped ease the concerns and tenseness that many of our citizens felt when initially meeting with him regarding a Codes issue.

When he retires, Jim plans to spend more time golfing, harassing his wife, and mowing his own grass, so that he doesn't get in trouble with the Codes Department.

John Dychala

John Dychala, our Public Works Director, is retiring on February 4, 2022. John has been the Borough's Public Works Director since 2013. He was hired as the Borough's Assistant Public Works Director in 2005 and has served our community with great pride for nearly 17 years.

When John took over as the Director of the Public Works Department, there was a great deal of work to do, as the department was in flux. John instantly worked to improve morale and create new initiatives that would save taxpayers hundreds of thousands of dollars, while making our operations more efficient. John improved the professionalism in the department, formed partnerships with our neighboring communities, and improved relationships with other departments. John changed the way leaf collection is done in the Borough, saving taxpayers over \$100,000 per year. Additionally, changed the way our snow plowing operation occurs, ensuring that the plows never leave the ground until the roads are cleaned. This has resulted in the Borough's streets being cleared long before many other communities. He has spearheaded initiatives to improve streambank restoration, stormwater improvements, sewer lateral inspections, and many other initiatives in our Public Works operation.

Troy Schantz

Troy Schantz, our Chief of Police, is scheduled to retire on January 31st, 2022. Chief Schantz has been with our Police Department since January 1991, having served 30 years as a Borough of Emmaus Police Officer. Chief Schantz is a lifelong resident of the Borough, having grown up in town, graduating from Emmaus High School, and only leaving to go away to college at Shippensburg University. After graduation, Chief Schantz moved back into the community and began working as an Emmaus Police Officer, where he spent his entire professional career. He was promoted to Sergeant in 2001. Prior to being promoted to Chief, he served on the Lehigh County Emergency Response Team for 20 years. In January 2021, Chief Schantz was promoted from Sergeant to Deputy Chief, and ultimately to the position of Chief in June. Knowing that he was only going to be the Chief for a short time, Chief Schantz has continued to work to ensure that the Emmaus Police Department remains one of the best in Pennsylvania.

Very few people spend their entire careers in one place. Fewer people spend their entire career working in the community where they grew up. Chief Schantz has always committed himself to our community and has always worked to make our community a better and safer place to live. He has served our department in many different ways, as he also oversaw fleet management, was our firearms instructor and coordinator, and led many initiatives to ensure the success of our Police Department.

When Chief Schantz retires, it will be hard to find him, as he plans to spend more time in the woods enjoying his passion for hunting.

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Special Recognition to a Man Who Left Us Too Soon



John Reiss, a Borough employee since 1978, left us too soon this past March, after a brief battle with cancer. John was a lifelong resident of the Borough of Emmaus and dedicated his life to us, working all the way up to two weeks before he passed away. He spent 41 years as a Public Works employee, having been hired when he was 18 years old. He was a volunteer firefighter for over 20 years, having retired from the fire service as our Assistant Fire Chief.

John was a very special person to all of us. He was a leader in every facet of our Borough. He mentored and trained both young firefighters as well as new Public Works employees. He led more initiatives than we can even count. He was respected and revered by employees in every department.

In our Public Works Department, John was often referred to as our senior group leader, as he was a supervisor in the department. He literally knew where every single water valve was located and where every secret was under ground in our water and sewer systems. He designed many innovative projects and coordinated many efforts in the department. He was the person that was called out in the middle of the night to lead the work crew to make an emergency water or sewer repair. John was extremely skilled

on our backhoe, as he could dig in very tight spaces, being able to scrape right along a gas line to get to our water line, without causing any damage.

John served as the Volunteer Assistant Fire Chief for many years, as he was part of the long lineage of Reiss family leadership that led our Fire Department for more than four decades. He oversaw the maintenance of our fire training grounds and led training efforts in the department.

John is survived by his wonderful wife, Tammy, as well as his by his mother, his son, and his daughter. Like a proud grandfather, though, his true pride and joy was his grandchildren. He loved to take them camping and sit around the campfire. On his days off, he'd often bring his granddaughter into Town Hall just to say hello to the office staff. You could truly see the twinkle and pride in his eyes every time he spoke about his grandchildren.

The community honored John at his funeral by giving him fireman's honors, while lining the streets with fire trucks and public works vehicles. In addition, a tree was recently planted at Memorial Triangle in remembrance and in honor of John. John will forever be remembered for the impact he made on our community as well as our employees and volunteers. John is truly missed by all of us.

Borough Offices Moving Soon

In past newsletters, we have kept you updated on the Borough's upcoming construction projects. It is close to time for shovels to hit the ground, as the projects are being bid out in the next few weeks. As a result of the proposed construction work, Borough Hall is going to get a major overhaul. During the engineer study phase, engineers have identified significant issues in Borough Hall that need to be mitigated. This includes HVAC issues, removal of the knob and tube electrical, re-wiring the entire building, all new plumbing, removal of mold from numerous locations, including under the roof, and asbestos removal. All of this work must be completed prior to any improvements to the building. As a result, Borough offices are going to be vacated for at least a year, and up to 18 months.

Therefore, the Borough has entered into a lease agreement with Phoebe to rent the old Rodale Daycare building at 420 S. 10th Street, across from Furnace Dam Park. The Borough will relocate to this building by approximately December 1, 2021 for operations. 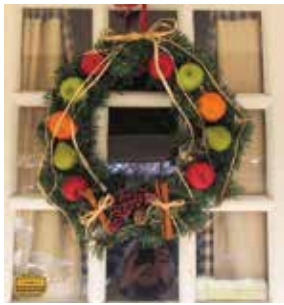
WE ARE!

EMS Subscription Update

By the time you read this, it is our hope that our Ambulance Subscription Program will be reinvigorated. The Borough has recently submitted an RFP to work with a company to revitalize our Ambulance Subscription program. The Borough's Ambulance Subscription Program has saved Borough residents tens of thousands of dollars over the years by offering discounts to subscribers for ambulance transports. As most of you will know, insurance companies do not cover 100% of your ambulance trip, and patients are often left with hundreds of dollars in additional bills, despite how good their insurance might be. The subscription program reduces the burden to patients.

The program was previously suspended because of the costs and inefficient process to manage the program. The Borough has located companies that specialize in administering this type of program. We will release more details as soon as the new program is available in the next few months.

The Emmaus Garden Club – Over the Backyard Fence

Autumn is always a busy time for the Emmaus Garden Club. New officers are elected, and plans are made for a holiday luncheon, where the newly elected officers are installed, programs and activities are put into place for the next year, and windowsill arrangements are created at the 1803 House for the Old-Fashioned Christmas celebration.

As we begin to spend more time indoors, we can continue to show our love of gardening by “planting” our window boxes and outdoor containers (winter proof) with greenery, berried branches, and evergreens. Remove spent warm weather plants, water generously, add twigs, branches, pine, or pinecones for a festive look. They are surprisingly long lasting!

You can bring nature inside too! Collect pinecones, nuts, chestnuts, acorns, etc. Bake in a 225-degree oven on foil lined sheets for an hour. This treatment will take care of any critters that may have come along. Put the collection in a bowl or basket, add some twinkling light, and you have a reminder of all those walks around town. Treating cones from white pine trees, as outlined above, will perfume your home and they will be shiny and bright when removed from the oven as their natural sap melts and varnishes them. Put them in the basket, too!

Membership in the Emmaus Garden Club is open to anyone interested in gardening, from large garden pots on your patio to plants in your home and you do NOT need to live in Emmaus. The garden club provides interesting program, on a variety of subjects, while sharing its love of growing. E360 Code



The Borough has contracted General Code to provide citizens with an easier way to access our Borough Code. The E360 Code allows you to enter a certain word and it will provide every part of our Borough code that contains the word. The program also allows us to access the relevant information that you are seeking in a much quicker and efficient manner. The program only stores Ordinances that have been codified and is usually about one to two years behind on current Ordinances therefore, we recommend that you contact Town Hall if you are researching a more recent Ordinance. E360 Code can be found on the Borough's website. On the website under "Government," click on Codes to locate the Borough's Ordinances.

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Sewer Lateral Inspection Program

In January 2019, Emmaus Borough Council adopted an Ordinance to require building sewer and lateral inspections any time a house is transferred or sold within the Borough. This was as a result of the PA DEP and EPA mandates requiring the community to eliminate the stormwater that is hitting the Allentown sewer plant. The Borough continues to invest millions of dollars into improving and removing stormwater from the main system, however, this is a key component of the infiltration and inflow that is hitting the system. The Ordinance took effect April 2019.

Ordinance No. 1185 requires anyone that is selling or transferring their property to have their sewer lateral inspected via a camera. Any licensed plumber who has the capability to conduct camera inspections may be used, or the property owner can contract the Borough to conduct the inspection. An electronic copy of the camera inspection as well as a report with the findings must be submitted to the Zoning Officer at Town Hall. If the result of the inspection demonstrates that water is infiltrating the system through deficiencies such as cracks or breaks in the line, or via root intrusions or other systematic failures, the property owner must fix or replace the building sewer or lateral prior to the sale of the property. The Borough monitors property transfers through data submitted by Lehigh County each month. If an individual fails to have the inspection completed, and the Borough receives the property transfer information, penalties are applied including fines.

The average inspection costs approximately \$225 - \$300. If there are serious issues with the sewer lines, it could cost much more, however, it is important to note that if there are issues with your lines, it means that pollutants are seeping into the ground and leaching into our potable water systems and / or rain water is hitting the sewer system, helping to cause overflows during heavy rains into the Lehigh River, meaning raw sewage is hitting the river as well. For these reasons, as well as due to the state and federal mandates, we need to ensure that the entire sewer system is working as it is designed and we are doing our part to eliminate these issues.

Identity Theft

Victims report spending approximately 30 hours and an average cost of \$500 after an identity crime has occurred. If there is the possibility that a portion of your information has been compromised, you are recommended to do the following as quickly as possible:



- Contact the IRS immediately! Call: 1-800-908-4490 or visit www.irs.gov to complete IRS Form 14039 (Identity Theft Affidavit).
- Obtain your FREE Credit Report at www.annualcreditreport.com (always remember - if the website address has "free" in the name, it probably isn't free.) The link provided above is! Once you have your report, review it to be certain there is no unusual activity or unfamiliar charges.
- Contact the three consumer reporting agencies to place a FRAUD ALERT on your credit: Equifax (1-888-766-0008), Experian (1-888-397-3742), and TransUnion (1-800-680-7289).
- Place a "Security Freeze" on your credit. Each consumer reporting agency has this option. You must freeze all three for optimal coverage. This is FREE and highly recommended to reduce the likelihood of credit information being obtained through the fraudulent use of a Social Security number. Please read each reporting agencies information in detail.
- Contact the Social Security Administration if there are any payments registered to yours or your child's social security number. (If disability payments are direct deposit, we advise placing a lock on your SS payments. This would require ANY changes (such as address, phone, bank acct.) to be done IN PERSON. Call the SS administration at (1-800-772-1213).
- Secure your Social Security (SS) Card in a safe and protected place. Never carry your SS card or number with you or in your wallet. Memorize your number.
- Protect Your Pin Number. Be sure to never write your PIN on a card or paper, however, if you need to, never keep it near the card.
- When doing online shopping, only do business with companies you trust and look for the "s" in the <https://> part of the website. This means the site is secure.
- Passwords. Change your password regularly and don't use any part of your SS number, maiden name, or well-known information that someone else might know or be easily able to find out.
- Protect Your Credit Cards by shredding credit card receipts and never give your card to someone else to use. In case of lost cards, keep a copy, front and back, safe at home.

Cold Weather = Hot Opportunities for Thieves

With the weather turning colder, many of us warm up our vehicles in the driveway before heading out in the morning. We all prefer a nice and toasty vehicle to take off in. So do thieves! Use common sense. It is best to NOT leave a vehicle unattended while running! It is actually illegal while on a street or highway!

Pa Vehicle Code 3701. Unattended motor vehicle.

(a) General rule.--No person driving or in charge of a motor vehicle shall permit the vehicle to stand unattended without placing the gear shift lever in a position which under the circumstances impedes the movement of the vehicle, stopping the engine, locking the ignition in vehicles so equipped, removing the key from the ignition and, when standing upon any grade, turning the front wheels to the curb or side of the highway and effectively setting the brake.

Sitting inside your vehicle is the only way to ensure that it isn't taken from your driveway while it's warming up. But if you insist on warming it up, keep a constant watch from a window or doorway. Don't open the door of opportunity to become a victim!

Parking Lot Prowlers

With shorter daylight comes an increase in people walking through parking lots looking for an opportunity to steal. Take the following precautions to help ensure that this does not happen.

- Never leave valuables in plain view.
- Hide chargers and accessories that could indicate electronics are inside.
- Remove garage door openers, key cards, or other keys.
- Park in well-lit areas at night. Always keep your head up and be aware of people around you, – and

Porch Pirates Can Steal Your Joy

- If available, use store pickup.

Call Before You Dig

If you are planning on digging, call Pennsylvania One Call System, Inc. (POCS) three business days before you dig at 1-800-242-1776 or 8-1-1. The call center is open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, every day of the year. PA Act 287 as amended requires excavators as well as private landowners to call POCS three days prior to any type of digging occurring with powered equipment. Mark your excavation area in white paint before calling with a dig notification.

By calling, you allow the facility owners the opportunity to locate and mark their underground facility in advance of the planned excavation (gas and liquid pipelines will mark underground facilities using yellow stakes, flags, or paint).

News from the Emmaus Shade Tree Commission

A Special Tree to Commemorate John Reiss



On a perfect fall afternoon in late September, family and friends of longtime Borough employee, John Reiss, gathered at Memorial Triangle to dedicate a tree in his memory. Reiss, who died in March 2021, worked in the Public Works Department for 41 years and as a volunteer Firefighter for more than 20. Among his many other responsibilities, Reiss was involved in the planting and maintenance of the many of the Borough's trees.

The Shade Tree Commission chose a 16-foot Jefferson Elm to honor Reiss' many years of service to Emmaus. The tree was planted in the park at Third and North streets in April and dedicated at a ceremony on September 25th. Jefferson Elms represent a comeback for the once-abundant American Elm, according to Commission Chairman, Reds Bailey, who spoke at the dedication.

"There was a time when Middle Atlantic forests consisted largely of American Elms," Bailey says. In addition to being a valuable forest tree, they were widely planted as shade trees in parks and residential neighborhoods. Because of their majestic and arching profile, American Elms were used to line countless avenues and boulevards in the United States. Their popularity contributed to their eventual downfall: When a virulent new strain of Dutch Elm disease began to sweep through the country in the mid-20th century, the leaf beetles that carried the disease from tree to tree didn't have to fly far before finding their next victim.

Even as Dutch Elm disease killed millions of trees in the eastern United States, a tiny minority of American elms showed natural resistance. One such survivor stands in front of the Smithsonian's Freer Gallery of Art on the National Mall in Washington, D.C. This exceptional American Elm has been cloned and given the variety name of 'Jefferson.'

"After extensive research and experimentation, new disease-resistant varieties of elms are showing great promise," Bailey says. "My particular favorite is the Jefferson Elm that, in maturity, displays what we consider to be the classic broadly rounded crown with wide branch angles and dark green foliage." The Jefferson Elm matures at 50 to 60 feet in height.

Although it shows a high level of tolerance to Dutch Elm disease, it is not immune. When releasing the variety to wholesale tree nurseries, the USDA specifically warned against "monoculture" plantings, in which streets and subdivisions are populated with nothing but Elms. Planting a diverse mix of tree species is a better strategy because it can limit the spread of diseases and pests. It also allows more healthy trees to survive a serious disease outbreak.

The Jefferson Elm, showing strength in overcoming adversity, is a fitting tribute to an outstanding citizen and Borough employee.

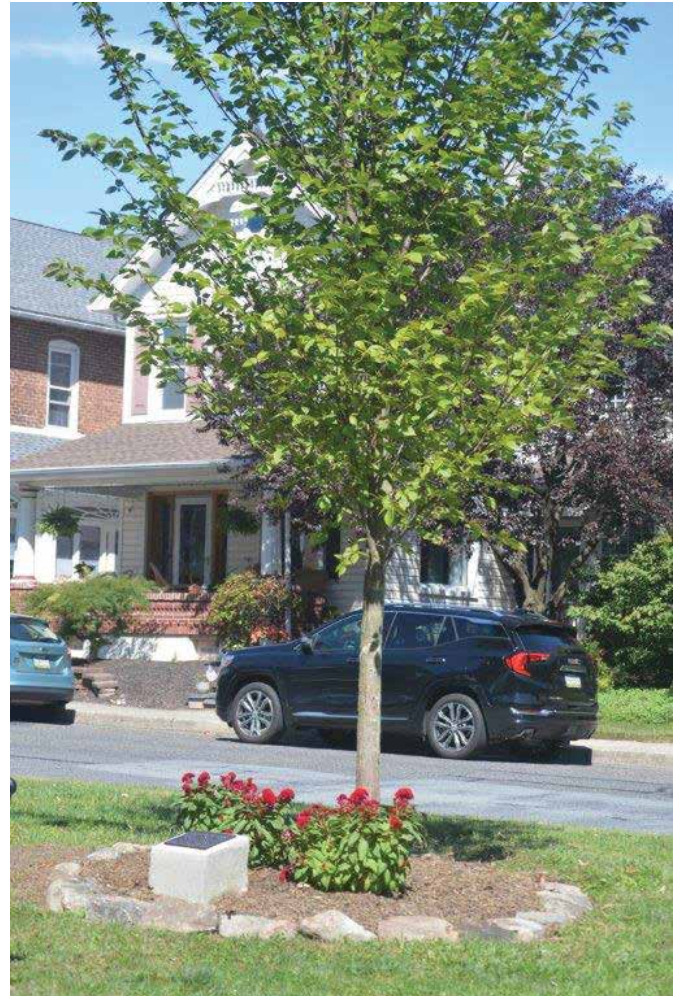

Call Before You Cut

The Emmaus Shade Tree Ordinance requires property owners to request a permit from the Shade Tree Commission before planting, pruning, or removing any tree in the public right-of-way (within 12 feet of the curb).

Curbside Leaf Collection

The Borough of Emmaus will continue its 2021 Curbside Leaf Collection through Friday, December 10th. The Borough is unable to set specific pick-up dates for leaf pick-up for individual streets throughout the town and recommends that leaves are raked out to the curb line the beginning of each week. The Public Works Department will continue to collect twice a week, however, please be advised that if the Borough encounters winter weather and the Public Works Department needs to plow the streets, any leaves in the road will be plowed. The Public Works Department will make every effort to get the roads cleaned up before the winter. For **FINAL COLLECTION**, please have your leaves out on Monday morning (December 6th) of the final week. Once the Public Works Department has made its final pass on your street, they will not return.

- Please rake all leaves to the curb into long narrow rows not more than 18" into the road. Leaves placed on the sidewalk will not be collected. The Public Works Department will not empty bags or other containers; this is the responsibility of the resident. Branches, shrubbery, grass, garbage, dog waste, and other building materials will not be picked up.
- Leaves will not be collected on private property. If leaves are not in place when the crews go by, they will be picked up on the following round through the Borough. No "return trips" will be made to pick them up.
- Residents who have areas designated as "No Parking" (yellow painted curbs) are encouraged to pile leaves at these locations for easier pick up.
- Piles with anything other than leaves will not be picked up. These objects will cause damage to the leaf pickup units and put them out of service at a great expense of time and money to the Borough and its residents.
- Do not place tarps over your leaves. The Public Works Department will bypass them and they will not be collected.
- To help facilitate the collection of leaves, please keep all vehicles away from the area where the leaves are piled. The Public Works Department will not rake piles of leaves out from between parked cars or from under them.
- Do not pile leaves on or around storm drains! This will cause flooding issues and create unsafe driving conditions.

Thank you for your cooperation. For additional leaf/yard waste disposal, the Compost Site is also open for drop off through December 17th.

The Borough's refuse collection company, Whitetail Disposal, will not collect trees left at the curb. Trees discarded after January 14th, 2022 will not be picked up. After January 14th, residents must take their tree to the Compost Site for disposal. The Compost Site will be open daily January 17th to 21st, 2022, from 7:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. for disposal of Christmas trees and other yard waste (no loading).

Parks, Recreation, Trails, Greenways, and Pool Studies Nearly Complete

Recreation is a key part of our community. Thousands of our residents use our swimming pool, parks, walking trails, athletic fields, or some other form of recreation. It is important that we continue to maintain our recreational system to help ensure the quality of life that the members of our community expect and deserve.

On September 29th, Simone Collins presented the final Parks, Recreation, Trails, and Greenways plan to the residents of the Borough. This study has been an ongoing process for the past two years, as the consultant has worked closely with our community members to identify and prioritize recreational needs for the next 10 – 15 years. Once the final report is submitted, the Borough will consider applying for construction grant funds to assist with the execution of the plans.

The Borough's pool study, being conducted by Aquatic Facility Design, is also nearing its completion. Residents were recently asked to answer several surveys regarding the pool, including opinions regarding our pool operations, as well as opinions regarding several pool conceptual drawings. The consultant is compiling results and is preparing to host a series of public meetings in the next few months. Be on the lookout for these announcements.

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Permits are Required

Do you need a building or zoning permit? Applications are available online! Download applications for permits right off of our website at: www.borough.emmaus.pa.us.

On the website home page, under the Residents drop down menu, click on "Forms/Applications" and choose which application you need. Simply fill it out and return the completed application to Borough Hall at 28 S. 4th Street, so we can begin processing your permit. Some examples of permits that the Borough of Emmaus require are: roof repairs, building repairs or remodels (causing structural changes), footers, foundation, framing, plumbing, electrical, signs, fences, sheds, dumpsters, demolition, driveways, pools, and zoning.



Moving Permits

A moving permit is required for any individual or family moving in, out, or within the Borough. The permit application can be obtained from the Cashier at Town Hall, 28 S. 4th Street, or by visiting the Borough website at: www.borough.emmaus.pa.us. 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Winter Stormwater Tips

As winter approaches and rain turns to snow, it is still important to consider stormwater pollution. Pollutants such as soaps, fertilizers, automotive fluids, and pet waste can collect in the snow pack, accumulating until a thaw suddenly dumps them into the storm water system. Contaminants that end up in the storm drains are carried off, untreated, to streams and larger bodies of water that are used for drinking, swimming, or fishing.



Here are a few helpful habits to reduce the amount of harmful pollutants entering storm drains this winter season:

- **Winterizing vehicles.** Check that your car is not leaking oil or other fluids. It takes only a small amount of motor oil to pollute thousands of gallons of water. Also, dispose of drained fluids properly. Many service stations, and the Borough during Household Hazard Waste Day, will collect used motor oil and recycle it. Please do not dump these items down the storm drains.
- **Washing vehicles.** On a warm winter day, you may be tempted to break out the hose and bucket to get some of the road grime off of your car. Take a moment to see where that runoff is going. Does it wash down the driveway and into the storm drain? If so, all that salt and dirt will enter a stream or pond. Using a car wash facility may cost a few dollars more, but the water will be treated before being released into the watershed.
- **De-icing driveways and sidewalks.** While it may be habit to stock up on salt for the winter, many people would not consider dumping a bucket of salt on their lawn in the summer. But the results are similar. Salt runs off of your sidewalk and onto the surrounding soil. Consider more environmentally-friendly deicing products like Rain-Ex, Enviro-MLT, or Easy Melt found at most auto parts and home improvement stores.

Adopt A Fire Hydrant

Do you live near a fire hydrant? If yes, would you like to consider adopting it this winter? If you have a hydrant in your neighborhood, please adopt it this winter by keeping it clear of snow and ice so that it is readily accessible in an emergency. Your assistance is greatly appreciated.



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Snow Plowing Tips and Reminders

The Public Works Department of the Borough of Emmaus is dedicated to the safety of its residents. At times, snow removal can be a monumental task and our Department of Public Works employees work around the clock to keep the State and Borough routes open. In an effort to prepare our residents for impending snow storms, the Public Works Department wants you to know more about snow removal and answer your most frequently asked questions.



- 1. When will my street be plowed?** Depending on the severity of the snowstorm, roads that will be plowed first are: the roads with the highest traffic volume, steep hills, state roads, snow emergency routes, roads near emergency service facilities, and roads near public institutions. While the storm is occurring, one pass is made in each direction of every street. After this is complete, or it is determined that the storm is coming to an end, the pushing back phase of the excess snow will begin. This is when all streets are cleaned curb-to-curb or to the shoulder of the road.
- 2. Should we move our cars from the street?** When a storm is forecasted, move vehicles to off-street parking when possible and keep vehicles off the street until plowing is completed. Parked cars can cause both a hazard and hindrance to snow removal efforts. This allows plows to clear the entire roadway the first time through, making return trips unnecessary.
- 3. What about driveways and sidewalks?** When cleaning your street, the crews have no place to push the snow except to the side of the road. This creates the unavoidable problem of already cleaned sidewalks and driveways to be covered with snow. Residents and business owners should wait until the Borough trucks and equipment have completed their work before cleaning driveways, sidewalks, and vehicles. Snow from vehicles and sidewalks should not be deposited back into that portion of the street where snow has already been removed. Do not shovel snow from your driveways into the roadway. This practice is illegal under the state motor vehicle code and Borough Ordinance 303 and is also hazardous. Fines for violations range from \$25.00 to \$100.00. Please do not shovel snow into the street! Residents are responsible for the actions of anyone they may hire for removal.
- 4. If the Borough pushes snow back onto my sidewalk, who is responsible?** Sidewalks are the responsibility of the property owner. Borough Ordinance 302 requires that all sidewalks must be cleared of snow or ice accumulations within twenty-four (24) hours after each precipitation ends. Failure to do so may result in fines for violations of the Ordinance. School bus stops must also be kept clear of snow and ice on the sidewalks.
- 5. What if my mailbox becomes covered with snow?** Your mailbox and the access to it, for the U.S. Postal Service, is the responsibility of the resident. Again, because the crews have no place to put the snow, roadside mailboxes may become blocked. Heavy snow may damage mailboxes. This is not intentional but may occur. Please make sure your mailbox is sturdy and in good repair. The Borough will not be responsible for repairs to mailboxes placed within the legally defined rights-of-ways of its roads, unless they are actually struck by the snow removal equipment.
- 6. What should I do if my lawn or landscaping was damaged by the snowplow?** Any objects that are placed within the right-of-way by the property owner, including trees, shrubs or lawns are not the responsibility of the Borough in the case of plow damage. If there are low hanging branches overhanging the roadway, the Borough's plows or emergency vehicles will not be able to make a clear pass through. Those areas may not be plowed and emergency vehicles may not have access. Please make sure that all overhanging branches are trimmed prior to winter.

Weather and snowstorms require patience, neighborhoods and businesses should work together. If practical, develop plans ahead of time in relation to where snow and ice will be stored. Contractors with plow equipment and residents with snow blowers should remain mindful of the direction snow and ice is removed from properties. Remember, we are all trying to achieve the same goal of keeping our roadways safe and traffic moving. During snow storms, SAFETY is the Borough's main concern.

PLEASE HAVE PATIENCE! Snow removal is tedious and a very time-consuming job. The Borough of Emmaus Public Works snow removal operators are human and work many hours under very difficult conditions to keep Borough residents safe. Please do not abuse them or threaten them or the Borough of Emmaus Police Department may be contacted. Travel should be limited during a snowfall and immediately after, unless absolutely necessary. Please do not call; unless it is urgent. When crews are removed from normal routes, it slows down the overall efforts. If a call warrants attention, the information will be dispatched and the crew will take care of the problem as soon as possible.

Winter Holiday Safety

Winter holidays are a time for families and friends to get together. But that also means a greater risk for fire. Following a few simple tips will ensure a happy and fire-safe holiday season.

HOLIDAY DECORATING

- ◉ Be careful with holiday decorations. Choose decorations that are flame resistant or flame retardant.
- ◉ Keep lit candles away from decorations and other things that can burn.
- ◉ Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use, but not both.
- ◉ Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Connect no more than three strands of mini light sets and maximum of 50 bulbs for screw-in bulbs. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of LED strands to connect.
- ◉ Use clips, not nails, to hang lights so the cords do not get damaged.
- ◉ Keep decorations away from windows and doors.

Before Heading Out or to Bed

Blow out lit candles when you leave or go to bed. **Turn off** all light strings and decorations before leaving home or going to bed.

HOLIDAY ENTERTAINING

- ◉ Test your smoke alarms and tell guests about your home fire escape plan.
- ◉ Keep children and pets away from lit candles.
- ◉ Keep matches and lighters up high in a locked cabinet.
- ◉ Stay in the kitchen when cooking on the stove top.
- ◉ Ask smokers to smoke outside. Remind smokers to keep their smoking materials with them so young children do not touch them.
- ◉ Provide large, deep ashtrays for smokers. Wet cigarette butts with water before discarding.

Pre-paid debit cards not accepted as bill payments

We continue to get reports of customers being targeted by scammers pretending to represent PPL Electric Utilities.

These thieves call customers, falsely claim an overdue bill, and threaten to shut off the customers power unless immediate payment is made with a prepaid debit card. The seek out both residential and business customers.

We want our customers to know two key facts that will help foil scam artists.

- We don't accept any prepaid cards as a bill payment.
- We don't call you and threaten to cut your service.

Electricity theft:

dangerous and illegal

Electricity theft – tampering with or bypassing meters or tapping power lines – is not only illegal, but it can be deadly for those involved.

In addition to the danger posed to the electricity thief, stealing electricity can be dangerous to line workers and emergency responders because it could feed electricity back into a line they believe is de-energized.

If you suspect someone of tampering with electricity, leave the area immediately and call 1-800-DIAL-PPL (1800-342-5775) to report the incident. Calls can be anonymously.
